The week of September 23 - 27, was highlighted by a variety of Orange Shirt Day and National Truth and Reconciliation Day activities. Guest Rob Malo, a Franco-Manitoban Métis member of l'Union Nationale Métisse Saint-Joseph du Manitoba, who is a storyteller, author, stage performer, juggler, poet, and community builder kicked off the week by sharing French-Métis and reconciliation themed stories with music, jigging and juggling to the junior high students. Focused curricular learning occurred in many different courses all week long. Many indigenous games were played in Phys. Ed. classes; students cooked Bannock in Foods class; in high

school Social Studies students looked at significant events in First Nations, Métis, & Inuit nationalism and effects of globalization; in high school Language Arts students chose and researched and presented on an amazing Indigenous person who has influenced history, overcame a substantial obstacle, or is positively impacting society today; Language Arts 30-1 were reading the short story "Totem" by Thomas King (former professor of Native Studies at University of Lethbridge), analyzing and themes and symbolism which arise in the story; junior high Language Arts classes the students studied the history of oral

Mrs. Scully and Mrs. Hart would like to encourage any grade 9-11 students, wishing to attend a post-secondary institution after grade 12, to attend open houses. Often students feel the academic pressure of grade 12 and do not have the time to attend these all day sessions in their last year of high school. Picking the right post-secondary institution is an important first step to making the transition from high school. The chart on the next page provides dates of Open Houses at postsecondary institutions. Many secondary institutions waive the registration fee if you attend an open house and register on that day. Some post-secondary schools encourage students to come and be a student for the day and have separate days allotted for just that. Grade 12 students are encouraged to see Mrs. Scully if they need <u>help registering for post-secondary study</u>. Use the Apply Alberta website to start this process. This website prepares the information needed to apply to any post-secondary institution in Alberta thus streamlining the application process.

(Use a private email address for this process as your BTPS account ceases to exist 1 month after graduation.) You will also need an Alberta Digital ID to access some of the sites. This is the same information needed to access your health records. Some postsecondary institutions base acceptance on competitive averages while others are based on a first applied, first qualified basis. Applying to at least 2 post-secondary institutions gives you more options for acceptance. Remember you will need a credit card to submit application online. Many postvour secondary schools open registration on October 1, so apply quickly.

High School students should also be searching for scholarships as well. Oftentimes you will need two letters of reference for these letters, so start asking people who know you best to write your reference letters. Also see http://studentaid.alberta.ca/ for scholarships available through the provincial government. Some due dates are fast approaching. Also, for **Grade 12 Students** the first meeting to discuss graduation criteria and the graduation event is scheduled will occur in October. Watch for more details.

Remember the **STRONG Interest Inventory** is available through your counselor and VIBE Coach for any grade 11 & 12 students who are having trouble deciding on a future occupation. It is a great way to start the career planning process. See Mrs. Hart, Mrs. Scully or your VIBE coach, Ramona for further information. A special **thank you to VIBE** for sponsoring the cost of this career planning tool.

Work Experience students are asked to contact their counselor first: Mrs. Scully (gr. 10 & 12) or Mrs. Hart (gr. 11) prior to enrolling in this program. Mrs. Kaye will be the one responsible for administering the program and she will require students to check in regularly to meet deadlines and hand in hours or paperwork.

RAP (Registered Apprenticeship Program). For these programs, students will enroll through Mrs. Hart. The RAP program is available to high school students who are interested in pursuing a trade. Students can earn up to 40 high school credits through the RAP Program. The student must find an employer who is willing to take you on as an apprentice and then you can begin accumulating hours as part of your high school program.

Social Emotional Coach


Welcome Back Amy

New SMS Messaging System: SchoolMessenger

Buffalo Trail Public Schools has recently adopted a new messaging platform, SchoolMessenger. As part of this implementation, we are required to seek permission from any potential recipients to reach them via SMS text message.

On October 1, 2024, we will be enabling the SMS features of the platform. In order to ensure you are ready to receive texts, you need only follow 2 easy steps to optin:

- 1. Make sure the school has your mobile phone in our system.
- 2. Text Y or Yes to 978338.

After sending that text, you will be con-

firmed as "opted in" and you will receive any text messages they send out after Oct.

On October 1, for any phone number we have on file who has not already manually opted in, a confirmation text will be automatically sent. You need only to reply Y or Yes to the text message to opt-in. The message should be from 978338 and will read: "Buffalo Trail Public Schools text messages. Reply Y for aprx 3 msgs/mo. Txt HELP 4info. Msg & data rates may apply. See schoolmessenger.com/tm" If you do not wish to receive text messages, no action is needed and any prompts can be ignored.

Fighting off fall fatigue

As we adjust back into the school routine, we may be tempted to reach for an energy drink to ward off an afternoon slump or early morning fatigue. While their marketed with claims of increased energy and improved concentration, what do we really know about energy drinks?

- Energy drinks can contain caffeine, added sugars and other stimulants.
- A single energy drink can contain 160-180mg of caffeine which is almost half of Health Canada's recommended daily intake for adults (400mg daily) and over the maximum amount recommended for children and youth (100mg daily).

Risks of energy drinks

- High amounts of sugar, which adds calories, and can increase blood sugar in those who have diabetes.
- High amounts of caffeine, which can make high blood pressure and abnormal heartbeats more likely in those who have heart problems.
- The caffeine in energy drinks may make it harder to sleep. Over time this can lead to sleep deprivation.
- Mixing energy drinks and alcohol together can make the effects of alcohol harder to notice. People may feel they are not as intoxicated as they really are and drink more.

Effects of caffeine and sugar from energy drinks

- Caffeine stimulates the central nervous system for up to 6 hours.
- Caffeine can increase blood pressure, irritability, restlessness, nervousness and contribute to difficulty sleeping, irregular heartbeat, headaches and tremors.
- Caffeine can affect how some medications work.
- One energy drink can contain up to 54 grams of sugar which is the same as 13.5 sugar cubes.
- The quick-digesting sugars in these drinks can lead to significant energy spikes and crashes.

Talk to your children and youth about energy drinks and caffeine:

- Have informed conversations about these drinks
- Explain that energy drinks are not meal replacements and drinking them on an empty stomach can worsen side effects.
- Mixing energy drinks with alcohol can be dangerous.
- Encourage other ways to increase energy such as a consistent sleep schedule, regular physical activity and balanced eating.
- Make gradual steps to reduce intake instead of stopping abruptly as withdrawal symptoms can happen.
